

RCMPD GLOBAL GRANT FOR "WOW" MOBILE CLINIC APPROVED BY RI

Current Situation

The World Health Organization 2020 Tuberculosis (TB) report cited that the Philippines has the highest TB incidence rate in Asia, with 554 cases for every 100,000 Filipinos (one for every 180 persons).

Many people in poor communities frequently do not know they already have tuberculosis. They are also unaware of the Philippine government programs on TB Directly Observed Treatment Short-course (TBDOTS*).

The 2016 National TB Prevalence Survey pointed out that only 19% of people with TB symptoms sought treatment and care. The rest would do nothing or self-medicate.

What is Needed

There needs to be more well-equipped public health centers in the poorest communities that could help community residents detect these diseases in time for proper treatment.

Basic health check-ups, usually done by a general practitioner medical professional, are rare to non-existent.

A Solution

A US\$75,000 Global Grant was approved! This project aims to promote and conduct regular testing and screening for tuberculosis, cardiac disease, and basic health check-ups.

The project entails the purchase of a mini-truck and its conversion to the Wellness and Outpatient Services on Wheels (WOW) Mobile Clinic, which will be equipped with an X-ray machine, electrocardiogram (ECG) machine and other basic check-up medical tools.

Our Beneficiaries

The mobile clinic will be turned over to, owned and operated by, Couples for Christ - Answering the Cry of the Poor Foundation (CFC ANCOP), which has a vast network of volunteer medical professionals with 25 years of medical mission experience in the poorest communities of the Philippines.

As a result, tuberculosis disease and general medical check-ups will be more readily available to thousands in Metro Manila and Luzon provinces at ANCOP community sites and Rotary-designated areas, including the Parañaque-Ancop-Rotary (PAR) 1 and 2 Rotary Homes projects.

ANCOP will also conduct ancillary services in adjoining tents such as medical consultation, dental extraction/filling, circumcision, eye refractions, vaccinations, and basic life support, training and orientation.

Choose Kindness

ROTARACTORS ARE BUILDING A SUSTAINABLE PROJECT'S FOUNDATION

The Rotaract Club of Makati Premier
District members met with us to discuss a school campaign they would like to spearhead. The campaign's name is "Choose Kindness," a holistic campaign to promote kindness amongst Francisco F. Benitez Elem School 3 (FBES3) children and keep bullying at bay.

The campaign aims to promote kinder behaviors like sharing and collaborating and discourage unacceptable, unkind behavior, like name-calling, pushing, taunting, etc.

Many US schools are currently implementing a version of this campaign. One of the parents, whose son was shot in the 2012 Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting, started the "Choose Love for Schools" campaign. Today, schools learn from each other to implement their own.

We had a great brainstorming session while we built the campaign's framework. We plan to have a fully assembled campaign for the next school year to educate children on proper kind behaviors, reinforce peace-loving attitudes throughout the curriculum, and build an active reward system.

The "Choose Kindness" campaign is an exciting sustainable project with lasting effects. If successfully implemented, it will be a lasting legacy for our Rotaractors to the children of FBES3.

RCC-MPD: INNOVATIVE ENTREPRENEURS

The Rotary Community Corp of Makati Premier District (RCC-MPD) has set 3 goals during their July 2022 Strategy Planning session. One of its goals is to be financially self-sufficient.

RCC President Jereth Gallero gave an inspiring presentation called "Madiskarteng Misis sa Panahon ng Krisis: Usaping Pangkabuhayan Dagdag Kita sa Kabuhayan" during the August 2022 Brigada Eskwela of F. Benitez Elementary School III in Barangay Singkamas, Here, she presented her own Do-it-Yourself starter business of dishwashing liquid.

The RCC members adopted Jereth's idea and scaled this business wider for their club, RCC-Makati Premier District. They knew that adopting this business model would be a way to achieve their RCC goal of economic independence.

PRODUCT LINE

And thus, was born a dishwashing product line called "Ultra Clean Dishwashing Liquid." This product is an effective grease-cutting liquid detergent in various sizes and three scents: lemon, kalamansi and antibac.

With the help of the Rotary Club of Makati Premier District, the RCC of Makati Premier District started a more extensive production on November 5, 2022. The RCC began producing 10 gallons per month.

RI President Jennifer Jones was impressed as she stopped by the RCC-MPD booth during this RY's RCC Showcase.

Today, they are producing 30 gallons/month. They have acquired a regular customer, a poultry farm, with bigger orders of 10-15 gallons per month. They have likewise expanded their product portfolio to include handwashing liquid soaps.

The RCC-MPD has created product and pricing differentiation. Budget product offerings use recycled water bottles. A budget 1-liter dishwashing liquid sells for P40. If the customer brings their bottle, the refill costs P30.

PRODUCT EXPANSION

"Upper-scale products" come with nice pump bottles and more attractive labeling. A 1-liter bottle sells for P250.

In addition, they have packaging deals. For example, a "negocio pack" comes with 6 liters of dishwashing liquid + six packs of 250 ml dishwashing liquid.

They sell through word of mouth, social media, and now online at shoppee.com!

Their initial funding of P5K has now grown ten fold!

SHARING THEIR KNOWLEDGE

The RCC-MPD members have learned a new way of making a living and become experts by giving entrepreneurial talks on a series they call "Matuto at Kumita: Pangkabuhayan Serye".

They have given these talks in different communities, such as Barangay Singkamas, Barangay Lagadlarin Lobo, Batangas and to community organizers, such as the Kalipi Women's Group in Barangay Singkamas. And now, they are receiving invitations to speak also in different schools in Makati City.

There are several drivers of project sustainability: consistent teamwork and dedication, continuous training of RCC-MPD members interested in production or sales, product and sales channel expansion.








- resists any tendency to act in terms of national or racial superiority
- seeks and develops common grounds for agreement with peoples of other lands;
- defends the rule of law and order to preserve the liberty of the individual so that he may enjoy freedom of thought, speech and assembly, and freedom from persecution, aggression, want and fear;

- supports action directed toward improving standards of living for all peoples, realizing that poverty anywhere endangers prosperity everywhere;
- upholds the principles of justice for mankind;
- strives always to promote peace between nations and prepares to make personal sacrifices for that ideal;
- urges and practices a spirit of understanding of every other man's beliefs as a step toward international goodwill, recognizing that there are certain basic moral and spiritual standards which will ensure a richer, fuller life.

That is quite an assignment for any Rotarian to practice in thoughts and actions!






