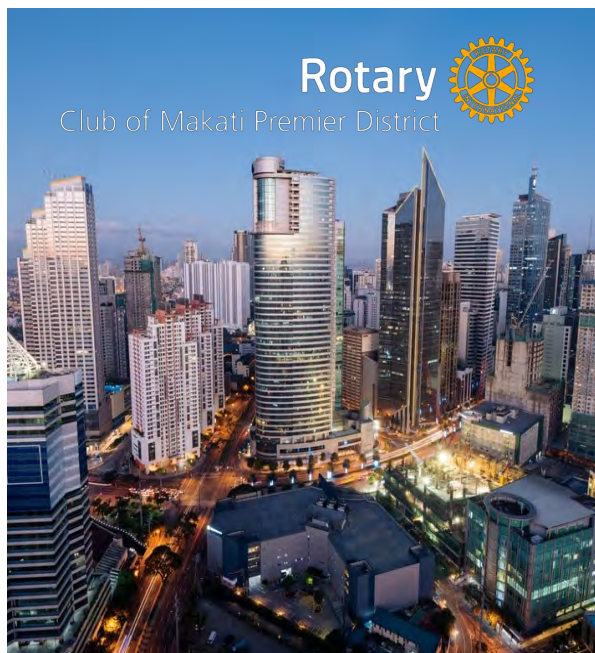

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Finding Rotary Led to Finding Home *Club Induction Speech*

I am an accidental Rotarian. I was not looking for Rotary, but Rotary found me.

My story began when my family immigrated from the Philippines to the States. I was only 17 years old when we left. I finished all my undergrad and graduate schooling in American universities. I worked and thrived in this new country. Deep inside me, though, I was searching for meaning. I had a longing to be able to share and give back to the land I left over forty years ago.

I shared this longing with a friend four years ago. Several months later, she introduced me via email to Rina Lopez, her high school classmate. I followed up, and soon after that, Rina and I were both in zoom, re-introducing ourselves, with Rina sharing all the great work Knowledge Channel is doing for the education of poor Filipino children.

I said, "I'm in! I would like to help you". The timing of when I would make it to the Philippines was unclear. I thought about it, and in less than 24 hours, I sent her a note saying I would be there in a couple of months.

You see, we had this trip that I, my husband, and my son had planned for Japan to climb Mount Fuji in August of 2018.

And so, after our trip to Japan, I did not return to Los Angeles. Instead, I bought a ticket to fly from Japan to the Philippines. I think Rina was surprised that I would be coming so soon!

I volunteered to do what I do best - a marketing consultant for Knowledge Channel Foundation. I met other new friends through Rina, and the next thing I knew, on this same trip, I was being inducted as a new Rotarian!

I was reluctant to be a Rotarian. I did not know what Rotary was all about. But I am glad I became one.

It's been four years since that induction. I can truly say that my experience as a Rotarian at the Rotary Club of Makati Premier District is a microcosm of a life well-lived. It's a perfect harmony of applying my professional skills while all of us in the club collectively help others.

I may be 15 time zones away, but my club-mates trusted me to lead our award-winning Public Image team and two large club fund-raising projects. PDG Chacha Camacho invited me to be one of the organizers for Discon 2020. The work continued as I also became one of the contributing members of what is now a national Rotary endeavor, Bale Talk Talkan. I researched and wrote all the interview questions for the sessions with Jennifer Jones, RI President, and John Hewko, RI Chief Operating Officer.

Giving back to the country I left 40 years ago has been a rich and gratifying experience.

For the next 12 months, I will serve as our club's president.

Much gratitude to all of you. Thank you for the opportunity to give back to my fellow Filipinos and the country I left over 40 years ago.

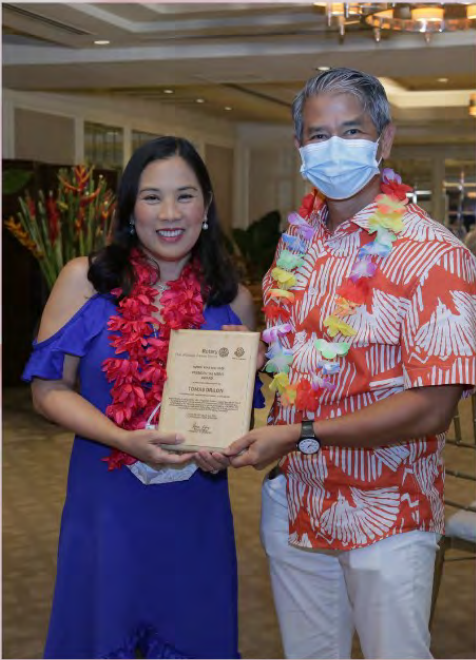

As invested stakeholders, we participated in Brigada Eskwela in 4 ways:

1. **Project SPESS:** a series of seminars to help strengthen parental engagement and support. Club member and psychologist Patti Go, delivered the first of a 3-part workshop series so parents can learn how to be more engaged to develop their children into well-engaged students in school.
2. **Providing breast and cervical cancer screening for teachers and parents.** Did you know that these two types of cancer are leading causes of cancer mortality among Filipino women? We can help. Teachers and parents can get free breast and cervical cancer screening. Our mobile clinic staffed with medical professionals from the Philippine Cancer Society will be here in FBES3 to serve you.
3. **Recognizing FBES3's honor students.** At a recognition ceremony, all 38 high achievers received certificates and a "school kit" comprising a backpack, notebooks, pens, and McDonald's gift certificates. In addition, the top 5 students received scholarship funds, and the top 2 will receive new cellular phones! We want to ensure our high achievers are ready to reach higher academic goals!
4. **Free eye care seminar** led by our club member and head of Rotaract, Dr. Sharon Vaswani.

Since our club's inception five years ago, we have chosen Barangay Singkamas/ FBES3 as our adopted community. We have seen this community flourish so well, and we are proud of you!

Rotaract inducted officers were:



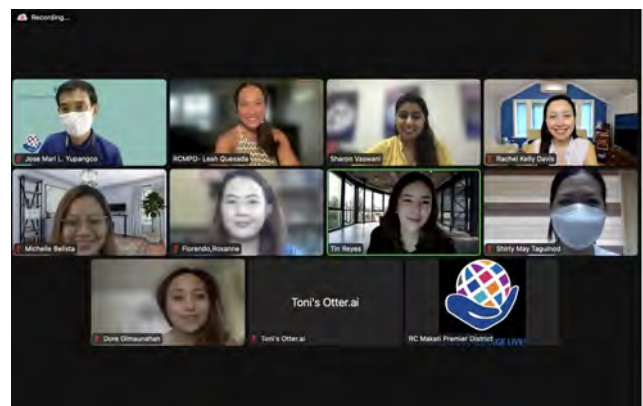

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION CODE OF CONDUCT

Rotary core values: fellowship, integrity, diversity,
service, and leadership

This code of conduct reflects our core values and explains the responsibility that comes with being a Rotarian and Rotaractor, which includes members from nearly every country in the world, speaking over 100 different languages. We are committed to upholding and evolving this code as our organization grows.

Like our core values, we expect Rotarians and Rotaractors to exemplify this code of conduct as they interact with one another, Rotary program participants, Alumni, project partners, and members of the community. Specifically, the code of conduct applies at all club, district, zone, and Rotary International meetings, trainings, events, and anywhere else a member represents Rotary and on My Rotary and social media.

Expectations
