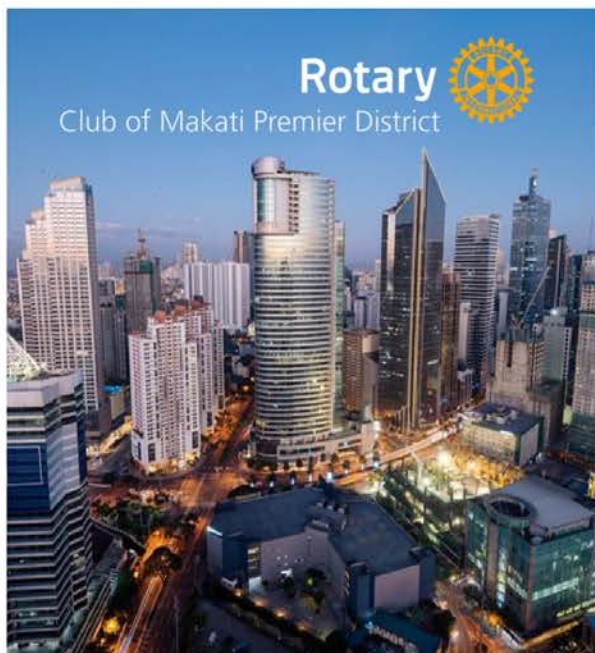

We proudly presented Edilyn with her project named **"Project Gumne"**; meaning home in the Blaan dialect, as our candidate for 2022 **The One Philippines**. During the September Gala, she was awarded as a finalist in the nationwide search.

Edilyn came to RCMPD after vetting at least 6 other candidates to meet the requirements for the TOP competition. Recently, she was appointed Chairperson for the Department of Tourism at the University of Cebu, while concluding her doctorate.

Despite her busy schedule, she continues her drive to help the children of the Blaan Tribe with the Kiahe Integrated School to build a dormitory for the children.

The travel time for the indigenous children is about 4 hours crossing rivers, mountains, and ravines just to reach the school. Project Gumne will provide housing for them

RCMPD continues to support her by donating the PHP 50K awarded to us by TOP, holding fundraisers, and other various avenues.

Blaan Children Project Gumne

Who are they?

The Blaan tribe is one of the indigenous peoples in the Philippines who are living in poverty-stricken areas of Sarangani province, listed as one of the poorest provinces in the Philippines.

Blaans are known for its very rich culture especially on beadwork and Tabih weaving (finished handwoven cloth made of abaca).

What is the project about?

The construction of a sustainable dormitory for the 72 Blaan students and their teachers. It is a four-room dormitory at the Kiahe Integrated school.

Eliminates the travel through the treacherous terrain for 2-4 hours.

This project will address the following problems: less to no access to quality education

and other livelihood opportunities; for the students not being the subjects of fixed to marry and heavy farm-related works; and challenges in facing the rising river and muddy embankments.

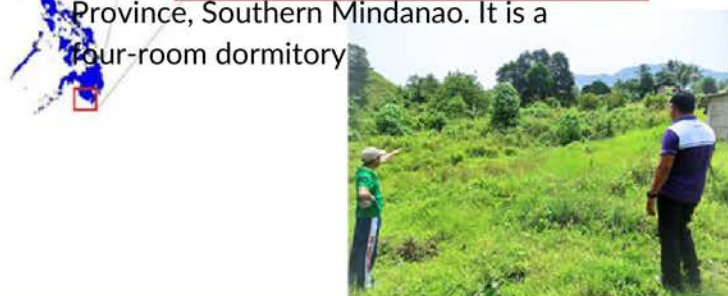

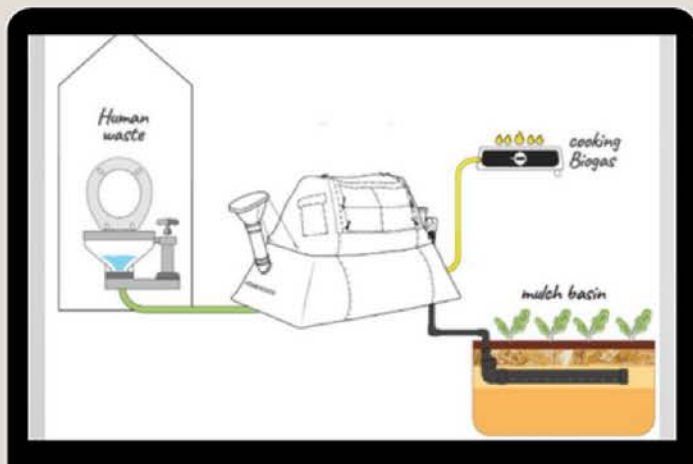

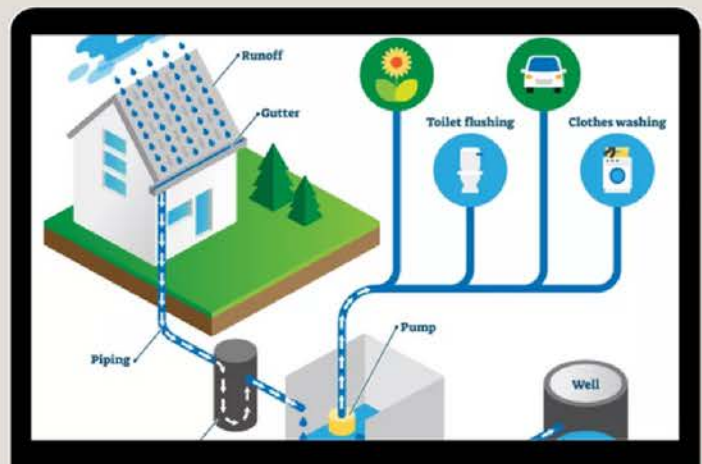
Use of Solar Lights

SAVING LIVES

THROUGH EARLY BREAST AND CERVICAL CANCER DETECTION

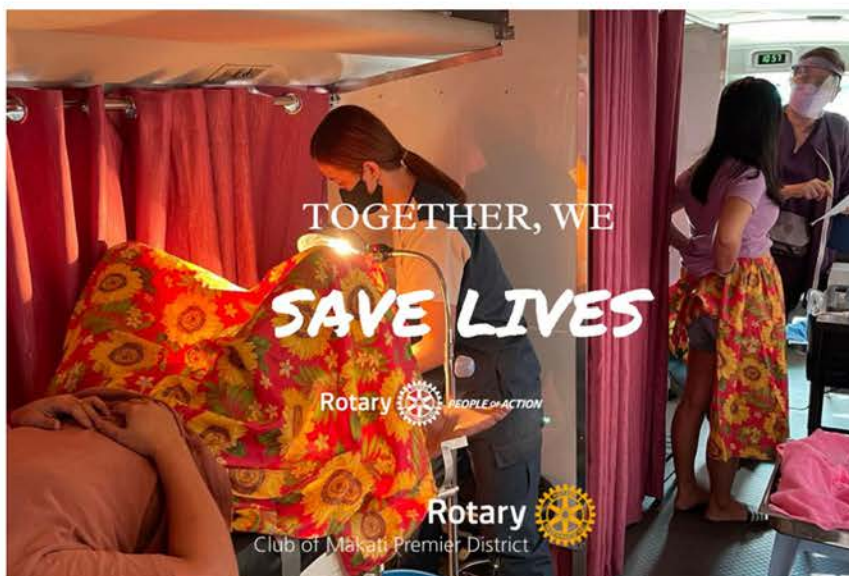
Did you know that 3 in every 100 Filipino women will be diagnosed with breast cancer? Cervical cancer is the second leading cause of cancer mortality among Filipino women, accounting for 6% of female cancer deaths.

We can save lives through early detection so that women can take preventative measures to avoid these diseases. We are inspired to know that we can help and make a difference.

Enabled by two global grants, we donated two mobile clinics to the Philippine Cancer Society (PCS), whose medical staff provides breast and cervical cancer screening to women in different communities.

Breast cancers that are found because they are causing symptoms tend to be larger and more advanced. In contrast, breast cancers found during screening exams,

like our mobile clinic exam services, are more likely to be smaller and still confined to the breast. The size of breast cancer and how far it has spread are two of the most critical factors in predicting the prognosis or outlook of a woman with the disease.

The best way to find cervical cancer early is to have regular screening tests, such as pap tests, which our PCS medical staff provide. Routine screening is critical to prevent cervical cancers and saving lives.

Early detection dramatically improves the chances of successful treatment of pre-cancers and cancer. Getting checked regularly can put a woman's mind at ease. Finding cancer early may also save their life.

Our mobile clinics have tested many women in communities far beyond our sphere. Through a convenient website, rcmpd.org/savelives, any Rotary Club or NGO can register to implement breast and cervical cancer screening outreach in their chosen communities.

Since April 2022, when we started the operation of our two mobile clinics, there have been 73 medical missions and 4500+ patients. Communities have included barangays, schools, churches, and companies. Of the 4482 breast exams, 599 exams yielded breast mass findings. 73 out of 3145 cervical tests were positive.

I am delighted that many of my Rotary classmate presidents and other Rotary club past presidents have taken up our club's offer to avail themselves of these mobile clinics. Many of our club members have done the same thing by providing cancer screening in their places of work, communities, churches, and schools.

The equation is simple. Early detection saves lives. Help save lives by reserving one of our mobile clinics soon!

"TOGETHER LOVE" EVENT



On September 30, 2022, Jose Mari Chan, Filipino singer, TV host, songwriter, and businessman, became the new ambassador of **Let's Save The Brain Foundation** in an event called "Together Love". On the same day, the foundation gave a plaque of appreciation to four Rotary Clubs.

In 2019, four Rotary Clubs collaborated to provide 13 bedside monitors for Philippine General Hospital (PGH) stroke patients. The four Rotary Clubs were RC Makati Premier District, RC Makati Century City, RC Fort Bonifacio Global City, and RC Cheonan Chungnam (Korea).

Enabled by a global grant, the monitors were delivered to PGH in June 2020.

Present in the September 30 event were CP Carol Mercado, May Munoz, and Sharon Vaswani.



Let's Save The Brain was inspired by Dr. Wally Ledesma's talk, when our club invited and accorded her the Leadership Award on April 23, 2019 in RY 2018-2019. RCMPD member, Carol Mercado, immediately applied for a Global Grant. Through close coordination with doctors and fellow Rotary Clubs, the monitors were purchased, delivered, and are now fully operational at Philippine General Hospital. The unveiling of the plaque completes the project as PGH and Ward 5's token of appreciation to the Rotary donor districts and clubs.

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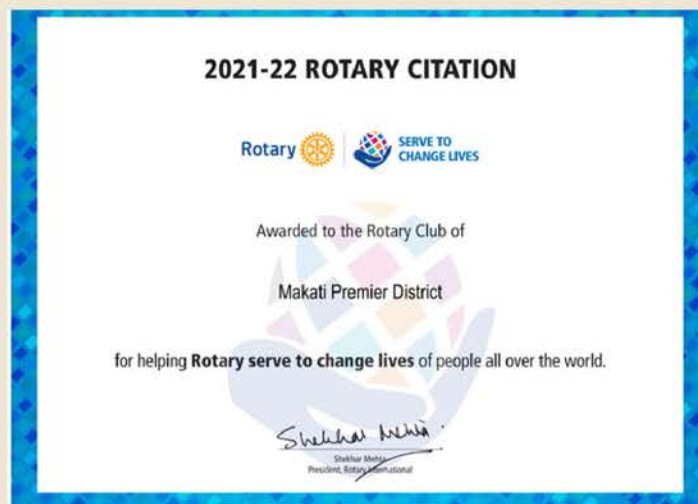

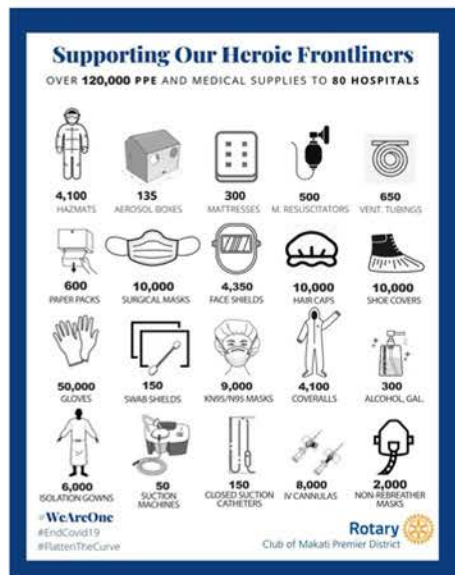

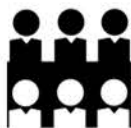

There's a 99.9% polio reduction worldwide. Pakistan and Afghanistan are the last two countries that have it. Until we end polio forever, every child is at risk.

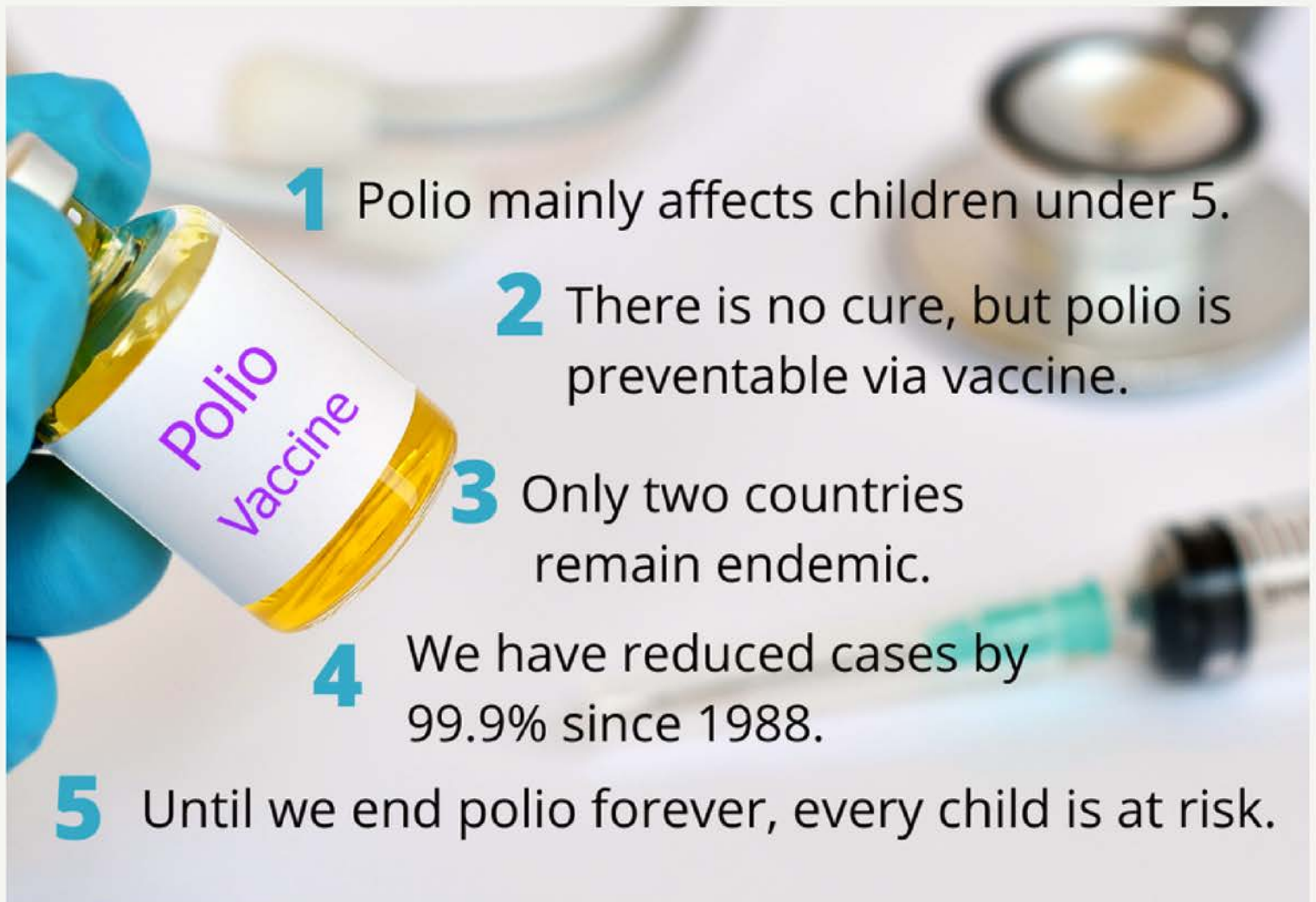
